**DEBBIE HARRY AND BLONDIE PERFORM FEB. 21
AT NORTHERN QUEST RESORT & CASINO**

SPOKANE, Wa. (Feb. 9) – Blondie, the 1970s rock band that made a solo star of lead singer Deborah Harry, makes its Northern Quest Resort & Casino debut with a single show Feb. 21.

Formed in 1974 by art student and guitarist Chris Stein and ex-waitress and singer Deborah Harry, Blondie quickly established itself as one of the icons of New York City's growing punk music and New Age scene.

Defying easy categorization, the band was known for writing great musical hooks and lyrics that were as brilliant as they were ironic.

As recording artists, Blondie initially struck gold in England with a series of hits before cementing their hold on the American music charts. A string of hits began to sweep America, with songs like "Heart of Glass," "Call Me," "The Tide Is High" and "Rapture"

all reaching number one.

Blondie has undergone several break-ups and reunions over the years. Harry left the band and pursued a solo career, sang in a group known as the Jazz Passengers and has amassed more than three dozen motion picture and television acting credits.

Fronted once again by Harry, Blondie was inducted into the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame 2006 and continues to tour and record today. Last year, the band celebrated the 30^h anniversary of its platinum-selling "Parallel Lines" album with a world tour. Blondie is also expected to release a new studio album this spring.
